Behaviour Policy:

Watermoor C of E Primary School is committed to creating an environment where exemplary behaviour enables all to feel safe and respected within an atmosphere of learning without limits.

Rewards:

- Golden tickets are awarded for significant effort or progress in learning or behaviour
- Vision and value certificates are awarded in Celebration Worship each week to children who have lived out our vision or Christian value of the week. Their first names will be published in the newsletter
- The house with the most points is also announced to the whole school (after a big drum roll!) This is shared in the newsletter

These are some of the things we are learning about in maths this year:

- Multiplication and division facts: consolidate 2, 5 and 10, New 3, 4 and 8
- Number and place value 3 digit numbers, including partitioning, adding and subtraction powers of 10 and placing on a number line
- Geometry properties of shapes 2D, 3D, lines and nets
- Addition and subtraction Mental and formal methods
- Fractions compare, order, recognise and calculate
- Multiplication and division moving towards formal methods using place value
- Measurement Money
- Measurement time seconds, minutes, hours, intervals for both analogue and digital
- Measurement length and capacity
- Measurement Angles
- Statistics pictograms, bar charts and tables









These are some of the texts and genres we will be covering in our writing this year:

Poetry:

- Autumn is Here focusing on word classes in SPaG
- Chocolate Poem (Michael Rosen)

Narrative (Fiction):

- The 3 little pigs traditional tales
- Charlie and the chocolate factory
- Flood Based on the picture book
- The Great Chocoplot

Non-fiction:

- A journal of Roman slave Diary entry
- Skeletons and Muscles information text









We will also be learning about:

- History The Romans, The Anglo-Saxons and the Mayans
- Geography Locational knowledge focusing on Europe, the UK and world geography (hemispheres)
- Science Health and diet, body including bones and teeth, forces, sound, states of matter, electricity.
- Art Roman artefact still life Paul Cezanne drawing, Meadow flowers Yvonne Coomber painting and multimedia, Mayan Masks - George Rodriguez - Sculpture
- DT Mechanisms, Cooking and nutrition, structures
- RE Christianity Creation story, following God and Jesus' teachings, Islam Festivals and worship, Judaism festivals and family, How people try and make the world a better place
- Music Ballads, adapting and transposing motifs, singing technique, traditional instruments and improvisation
- French Greetings, adjectives, numbers and age, classroom and transport
- PE Dance (Romans), Tag Rugby, Badminton, Athletics, Gymnastics
- Computing Online safety, touch typing, coding, email, presenting, micro-bits









These are some of the trips and experiences we have planned:

Corinium Museum – Cirencester - Tuesday 12th November 2024

This trip will consolidate our learning about the Romans, linked to the history of Cirencester.

Proposed but still to be confirmed:

Spring term: Synagogue trip (linked to study of Judaism)

Summer term: Cadburys World (linked to study of Mayans)










How can you help with your child's learning at home?

- Regular reading is key: including listening to your child read aloud (even if they are fluent) and asking
 questions about what they have read. At least 3 times per week is ideal
- **Spellings** These will come home on a Monday and be tested the following Monday. Practise them until they are fluent (they don't need to look at them). You can use any strategies in their spelling practise book to do this.
- Practise some **key maths skills; tables**! TTRS is set up for all children, with sessions set to help they increase speed and fluency.
- **e-safety** is a priority: create a safe and open channel for your child to talk about worries and concerns they have about what they are doing online, monitor your child's use of devices, use parental controls, consider PEGI ratings etc.
- Above all, a balanced diet, a good night's sleep and lots of praise and encouragement will do wonders!






What to do if you have any worries or concerns:

Have you checked to see whether your child is eligible for Free School Meals?

By filling in a very quick and simple form, your child may be able to have free hot dinners for their entire time at Watermoor.

We can also provide advice and support with payment for uniform, trips etc.

The school also receives around £1500 per eligible child to spend on ensuring your child, and all children at Watermoor, have access to the very best education and resources.

This is different from Universal Infant Free School Meals (children aged 4-7 get a free lunch) but equally important.

Schools across the country are chronically underfunded and we rely heavily on this money to sustain our school budget, so we would encourage you to apply even if you are sceptical about whether you qualify!
