





Behaviour Policy:

Watermoor C of E Primary School is committed to creating an environment where exemplary behaviour enables all to feel safe and respected within an atmosphere of learning without limits.

Through demonstration of our Christian values, **Hope, Respect, Courage Responsibility, Compassion and Forgiveness**, we will achieve our Vision.

Rewards:

- Each child is assigned to a 'house' and receives house points for super work, behaviour and/or for demonstrating our values
- Golden tickets are awarded for significant effort or progress in learning or behaviour
- Vision and value certificates are awarded in Celebration Worship each week to children who have lived out our vision or Christian value of the week. Their first names will be published in the newsletter
- The house with the most points is also announced to the whole school (after a big drum roll!) This is shared in the newsletter

More information about our Behaviour Policy, including how we support children's behaviour and emotional regulation, will be shared with parents and carers shortly.





Home time 3.15pm


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These are some of the texts we are reading this year:













These are some of the things we are learning about in maths this year:

- Number and place value up to 20 and then 100 including recognising, counting, comparing and ordering
- Geometry: properties of shape including recognising, naming and comparing 2D shape
- Addition and subtraction up to 20 (revisited multiple times throughout the year) including finding one more and less,
 using addition and subtraction number sentences, partitioning and finding an representing numbers in multiples ways
- Measurement: Length using non standard and then standard units to measure and compare
- Fractions including finding ½ and ¼ of shapes, objects and amounts
- Geometry: position and direction including describing position, movement and turns linked to fractions
- Measurement: time including telling and representing time to the nearest hour and half hour and sequencing events
- Multiplication and division including doubling and halving, counting in groups of 2, 5 and 10, using arrays for multiplication and grouping and sharing for division
- Measurement: money including recognising coins and notes
- Measurement: mass and capacity including recognising and comparing mass and capacity in non standard and then standard units.







These are some of the texts and genres we will be covering in our writing this year:

- Narrative story Based on the Queens Hat
- A non-chronological report based on toys from the past
- A persuasive leaflet based on a theme park
- Narrative story lost and found
- Poetry rhyming poem based on themselves







We will also be learning about:

- History Monarchs, toys throughout time (particularly from the Victorian era) and Edward Wilson.
- Geography locational knowledge about the UK, places, weather and temperature and develop fieldwork and map work skills
- Music musical vocabulary, pulse, rhythm, tempo and the feel of music, vocal and body percussion
- Science seasonal changes, animals including humans classifying by different groups, everyday materials, plants, the human body and senses.
- RE Judaism, belonging, Christianity: caring for the world, and what is God like?
- PE Kicking & striking, throwing & catching, gymnastics balance, jumping & coordination, athletics & dance
- Art drawing and mark making, collage, and colour and pattern
- DT food technology



How can you help with your child's learning at home?

- <u>**Regular reading**</u> is key: including listening to your child read aloud (even if they are fluent) and asking questions about what they have read. At least 3 times per week is ideal re-reading ensures children develop their reading skills and fluency. This in turn supports their learning in school; as children become more fluent in reading, they are more able to focus on their learning.
- Practise some key maths skills relevant to your child's age and stage of learning
- <u>e-safety</u> is a priority: create a safe and open channel for your child to talk about worries and concerns they have about what they are doing online, monitor your child's use of devices, use parental controls, consider PEGI ratings etc.
- Above all, a balanced diet, a good night's sleep and lots of praise and encouragement will do wonders!

Have you checked to see whether your child is eligible for Free School Meals?

By filling in a very quick and simple form, your child may be able to have free hot dinners for their entire time at Watermoor. We can also provide advice and support with payment for uniform, trips etc.

The school also receives around £1500 per eligible child to spend on ensuring your child, and all children at Watermoor, have access to the very best education and resources.

This is different from Universal Infant Free School Meals (children aged 4-7 get a free lunch) but equally important.

Schools across the country are chronically underfunded and we rely heavily on this money to sustain our school budget, so we would encourage you to apply even if you are sceptical about whether you qualify!
